geologists found evidence that that fault line routinely launches massive earthquakes that spawn huge tsunamis. Only then did academics start reexamining stories told by native people from Vancouver Island to Humboldt Bay, and collected by anthropologists beginning in the myths were, in fact, oral history.

The State of Oregon passed a constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of People's Utility Districts (PUDs) to give residents local control over the provision of electricity and other essential utility services. Tillamook PUD was the first PUD established in Oregon, with county voters approving the District on July 23, 1933, Getting power to the Nehalem Valley is a story on its own

On November 9, we'll hear from Joanna Stelzig of Tillamook PUD about the life-changing project that brought electric power to the Nehalem Valley. Did you know that Tillamook County established the first PUD in Oregon? Ms. Stelzig will shine a bright light on this story that began in the 1930s.

GOALS AND NEEDS

Earlier this year, NVHS conducted an annual goals setting session to help us identify what we wanted to do, when we wanted to do it, and what funding we would need to accomplish projects.

As a small, all-volunteer nonprofit, NVHS relies on membership fees for much of its budget. We apply for grants, but funding for cultural and historical projects are not easy to come by. We've been fortunate to have received small grants from the Autzen Foundation and Tillamook County Cultural Coalition.

However, it is not enough to undertake and complete big projects, such as digital archiving of historical records that Steven Gibson is working on. While much has been accomplished, thanks to volunteers, we have much more to do.

A few of our goals for this next year:

- Recording and filming oral histories
- Digitizing photo collections (hundreds of images)
- Developing intake standards for archival materials
- Improving facilities with new exhibit cases
- Building a permanent showcase for historic finds
- New door for the museum
- Sump pump to prevent flooding of museum floors
